(PM) HEAVEN IS REAL

NO MAN CAN SERVE TWO MASTERS

All who read this are probably familiar with the statement that is the title of this article. One place it is found is Lk. 16:13 where Jesus helped the Jews understand that one cannot hold to the world and to God. Like so many who claimed to be the servants of God, the Jews had gone the way of the world and thought they could be godly and worldly at the same time. Jesus clearly points out that to try to do so places us in the position of making a choice of one over the other.

What most people do not seem to realize is that when a child of God starts having to make the choice between God and the world, the world usually wins. It is rare that people turn back to God. The world is just too alluring. To worship and serve God requires work. To live a life of worldliness is easy and places no responsibility on us.

The world makes it easy to be lost, even convincing us that we are not lost even though we have rejected God. When the Jews chastised Jesus over this statement, he went right to the problem. In Lk. 16:15, Jesus told them they were those who sought to justify themselves. They measured themselves by

what man taught and not by what God taught. The word of God was not important to them. Paul worded it this way in 2 Cor. 10:12: "...but they measuring themselves by themselves, and comparing themselves among themselves, are not wise." Again, in Lk. 16:15, Jesus teaches us that those things which the world thinks are great or important, God considers an abomination. Sadly, too many Christians today are just like the Jews of the 1st Century and are being overtaken by the world (if they have not already been overtaken). And, like the Jews, they do not recognize that they have forsaken God and have become an abomination to God. We need to examine ourselves and look deeply at our lives. What is that by which we measure ourselves – the things of the world or the things of God?

We must be careful here, for to not see ourselves for what we really are will lead to our eternal damnation! Who are you serving in your life?
